After leaving the Australian coastline, the *Endeavour* touched on New Guinea and then went on to Java.

Up to this point, Cook had lost only about a dozen men - none of these from scurvy. Before the ship reached England twenty-five more men were to die from various sicknesses. In July, 1771, when the ship finally reached England, there were only fifty-six men alive on board. (The goat survived the trip too!)

Cook had made an important voyage. New Holland was finally understood, and New Zealand was almost completely charted. Apart from New Holland, no Great South Land existed. Much scientific information had been gathered, and Cook had shown the world how to beat scurvy.

Back in England, Cook was hardly mentioned in the newspapers. Despite all the remarkable things he had achieved, the general public heard little about him. The papers did report that a new land had been discovered, but they said it was discovered by Joseph Banks! The navy and the King knew that Cook was the real hero, even if the newspapers only praised Joseph Banks. Banks was given a knighthood, while Cook remained a lieutenant. It seems as though Cook did not care very much about being famous. He simply did his work and went home to his wife. Perhaps he knew the Scripture that says, "God resisteth the proud, but giveth grace unto the humble" (James 4:6).
